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Tenants Tone Up at the NYSC

The New York Sports Club, located on Second Avenue between 34th and 33rd Streets, is a popular hangout and exercise space for Townsley residents. SO LONG SOUPY SALES

Soupy Sales, the TV comic and long-time resident of the Townsley, died last month at the age of 83. Adored by millions of fans in the 1960s and '70s, Soupy was the quintessential slapstick comedian, following in the footsteps of Groucho Marx and Charlie Chaplin.

"Soupy loved this building. He said it was the best place in New York City," said his widow, Trudy Sales. The two met when both were appearing on the Ed Sullivan Show in 1965. Two years later, they reconnected in the cast of *Hellzapoppin*, and began dating, moving into the Townsley in 1968.

In 1995, a bad fall at the Emmy Awards brought on the first of what became multiple health problems. Six years ago, a series of strokes left him dependent on those around him. Neighbors who pitched in included Darryl Ortega and Marlin Swing (a former producer for Walter Cronkite on CBS-TV), who lived down the hall, and Michael Gregorio of 6H.

"Everyone in the building helped, but the doormen went way beyond the call of duty," Trudy said, adding that Soupy's wheelchair had to be lifted up and down the steps every time they entered or left the lobby. "Everyone was cheerful and kind. This building is a wonderful community. I want to thank everyone for their friendship and for the kind, caring help they gave us."

Water Tunnel Update

Neighbors are happy to finally have their street back. Wondering what all the construction was about?

City Tunnel #3 is the largest construction project in NYC's history, and is one of the world's engineering marvels. Construction began in 1970 and is expected to be completed in 2020 at a total cost of almost \$6B! The tunnel is being built in 4 stages, and will total more than 60 miles in length. Our street was part of the second stage. It was scheduled for completion in December 2009, and finished right on time!
